Terminal Device and Awake explore disability with edgy, fresh perspectives

Terminal Device – (World Premiere)

The cinema loves the one-armed bad guy, but just who is Captain Hook? *Terminal Device* is an autobiographical essay by a real one-armed man shown through pop cultural images and diving deep into notions of difference. The director's story of living as one of these "men with hooks" provides a fresh look into the lives of people with prosthetic limbs. Watch the trailer.

Awake – (West Coast Premiere)

Everybody knows what it's like to open your door and see a stranger, sent to tell you about Jesus. But Anna isn't everybody and neither is Doreen, the proselytizer who knocks. *Awake* is a film about what happens when you decide not to close the door on someone's face; when Jesus talk gives way to breaking into a house, baking a chocolate cake, smoking a joint, watching Ingmar Bergman, and more. *Awake* is the story of two women, seemingly so different, and the unlikely friendship they forge. What started in 1970 as a small showcase in Los Angeles, has grown into a sold-out international event. The festival exhibits the most innovative and provocative works from both seasoned filmmakers and emerging media arts professionals.

We are one of the few festivals, of any kind, in the country that is completely accessible. Filmmakers are traveling from Israel, Italy, France, England and Canada to participate in panels, engage with the audience and accept awards.

Festival Highlights

- We have selected the following awards to distribute this year: Best of Festival (Short), Best of Festival (Feature), P.K. Walker Innovation in Craft Award, Advocacy Award, Disability Justice Award, Liane Yasumoto Judges' Choice Award. Winners will be released just before the festival.
- We will bestow one *special* film a "Dissie" Award. Based on the infamous "Razzie," the "Dissie" is awarded to a film that has so completely missed the mark about disability that we want to hold it up as a shining example of what NOT to do when making representations of people with

disabilities. While the community is now casting their votes for "worst of the worst," the lead nominee is *Me Before You*, a movie which caused nation-wide protests from the disability community and has been called a "disability snuff film." Click here to read more.
